Records in those days were not kept as efficiently as they are now, but we are certain that the number of dogs rehomed has reached the 8,000 mark! SUNNY, pictured here with PADS kennels manager Louise Perrett and assistant manager Jo High, has been with PADS for eighteen months. Check out those eyes! Sunny is a cross Labrador-Husky, hence the black coat, the white chest and paws and the piercing ice-blue peepers. A boisterous six year old who can run like a greyhound, so far he has not found the right home, but Louise and Jo keep hoping that will happen one day. Louise says, "If he doesn't find a home he will stay with us as one of the PADS family at Forteviot. We just love him. One day the right person may come along but if not he has a loving home here with us always." Those eyes just bowl us over!!!"



Louise Perrett has been with PADS now for 27 of the thirty years PADS kennels have been open. No one knows more about rescuing and rehoming dogs than she does. Louise says, 'There are some dogs like Sunny who find it really hard to find the right home, while others are adopted soon after they come to us. Often it's just the luck of the draw. But he will be safe with us until we know we have found the right person for him! We once had two Malamutes for well over a year. We had no wish to split them up and finally they found a good home. It took a while! Some dogs need a lot of care and attention before they leave us. I shall never forget the fattest dog I ever saw, a very large black Lab who went on a strict diet before he found a home with a caring couple who gave him lots of exercise. What a transformation! He lost so much weight he won a 'slimmer of the year' title in London, and went on to live an active life. Then there was the dog that refused to leave us, a cute mixed breed called Frank who simply would not settle in any of the nice homes we found for him.

He just loved being at PADS! Eventually we gave up and he became a permanent resident with us until he died. Then there was Jess, a dear, sweet, gentle German Shepherd who was found at the bottom of an old mineshaft covered in cigarette burns. You can imagine our fury! She found a wonderful home with a lady whom she trusted and loved and lived to a ripe old age. Now we often see the results of people choosing a dog without researching the breed. A couple with a young family living in a flat buy a mastiff puppy off the internet then cannot cope when it grows and starts to bark because it hates being left alone all day. People who get a husky don't realise it needs miles of regular exercise otherwise it will get bored and eat the sofa. Choosing a dog is not all down to what it looks like, or which 'celebrity' has one. A wee mixed breed dog can be the best pet ever, happy to give you so much love and loyalty. Often it's the funny little scruff that can best establish that precious bond between dog and human which is such a unique relationship.'

<u>PAST</u>

Imagine a filthy, freezing, disease ridden Perth Dog Pound with rotten, rusty enclosures and no running water in which terrified, neglected stray dogs spent their last miserable days. A kind dog lover called Sylvia Hales, horrified at the conditions in the place, formed Perth Dog Aid, to find foster homes for the dogs to prevent them being put to sleep after seven days in this hell. A few months later PADS came into being and in 1990 the kennels at Forteviot were opened to rescue and care for unwanted dogs until homes were found for them. It had taken some years to establish the animal refuge, but at last there was new hope for the county's

abandoned dogs. Now we come to the <u>PRESENT</u>, when dogs arrive at PADS due to relationship breaks-ups and often the inability of owners to afford vet fees for their pets. We see the creation of the 'celebrity dog', the handbag pet and new crossbreeds such as labradoodles and cockapoos. We see sick dogs bred in puppy farms and hastily acquired poorly bred bulldogs bought via the internet who are hardly able to breath. Many people do not bother to research a breed before they buy and come to us because they cannot cope, hence the number of large dogs which arrive at our door. And now we face a rather scary

FUTURE in which no doubt dogs will become less and less a loyal friend and more like an extension of their owner's ego. We now have IVF clinics which create 'designer dogs' from badly bred animals unable to mate or give birth


naturally. Little French bulldogs now often have very narrow hips and must have litters by means of Caesarian section. Five years ago there was just one of these clinics in the UK. There are now 37 of them. How is it right to treat dogs like this, as just a money making commodity? The future looks bleak!

HAPPY TOGETHER AND YOUNG AT HEART !

THE STORY of wee terrier cross Mickey and his human Willie Cairns hit the headlines last year. PADS revealed that Mickey, then 16, was the oldest dog the charity had ever rehomed in the 30 years of it's existence. And on top of that, Willie, a retired lorry driver, was, at age 87 the oldest rehomer on record! Kennel manager Louise Perrett said, "A good few years ago we re-homed a little Scotty called Wee Mac and he was 14. Earlier last year we found a good home for a Golden Retriever called Heidi, also 14. However Mickey beat them both! And Willie, as far as anyone can remember, comes top for age in the rehoming stakes."

Mickey is now an amazing 17, and Willie will celebrate his 88th birthday in May. Willie says, "He is a fantastic little dog. We are inseparable. He is very protective of me and just stays by my side all the time. He changed my whole life." Willie's wife died in 2018 and he was a lost soul without her. His dog- loving family heard about Mickey, who had come to PADS and was looking for a new home. When he was introduced to Willie, they were the best of pals at first sight!

Walkies? You bet! Mickey toddles along beside Willie's scooter but that could all change soon. Willie is recovering from one hip replacement operation and hopes he will be fit enough for a second op on the other hip quite soon. Then there will be no stopping them!



Mickey may look like a ordinary wee dog, but his background is rather exotic. He was born in Mexico and came back to the UK with his owner, a retired lady who sadly died, and Mickey came to PADS.

Willie smiles, "He is my best pal. He's had quite an interesting life but is now settled here with me. He's the best wee dog in the whole world!" Good luck with those hips Willie. Time to get back on the road!
