BIG BEN'S SUPER-SLIM!

When Ben the Border Collie arrived at PADS nine months ago staff were horrified when he stepped on the scales. He weighed in at a shocking 42 kilos. That's just over 92 lbs. The poor animal could hardly walk and getting up on to his four legs from a lying position was a painful process due to arthritis. The sweet natured collie was sad and subdued by this huge amount of excess weight. However, at his most recent weigh-in nine months later the scales revealed that Ben had lost a staggering 17 kilos (just over 37 lbs). He has another couple of kilos to lose before he gets to his target of 23 kilos, which is close to half his original body weight when he arrived at PADS. The ten year old is now a happy, healthy, energetic dog whose life has been transformed thanks to his adoring human, former life coach and exercise specialist Jann Heigh along with help and advice from PADS's Agata Brzek. Jann has given Ben a wonderful forever home... and a life-saving diet! She said, "Poor Ben was so large he looked like a sea lion. His first attempts to climb a few stairs resulted in him falling on the second step. We had to do very short walks, just a few steps at a time , for he was so overweight that he could hardly stand up. Now he just wants to run and run like all collies but still has to take care due to his arthritis."



The 17 kilo bag of dog food represents Ben's amazing 9 month weight loss. Jann says, "He never complained, just gently ate up his rations." Treats? - "A little something a couple of times a week!" Ben was sponsored by friends and will raise over £800 for PADS when he gets to his 23 kilo target. Check social media for updates! FACT

Next time your dog snuggles up and licks your ear it's not just because it thinks of you only as a reliable food dispenser. Your dog really <u>does</u> love you. Using MRI scans, researchers found that the same region of the brain responsible for positive emotions in humans is activated in dogs as well. Dog lovers instinctively know this, but now we have <u>proof</u> that our best friends are sentient creatures just like us.

FACT

How does your dog show its love? If it senses you are upset it will climb up on your lap. It will sometimes stare at you - prolonged eye gazing is an attempt at bonding. It will try to herd you all together for protection on a family outing and it will get excited when it hears your name.

FACT

A dog's sense of smell is up to 100,000 times better than ours. Last month Covid 19 sniffer dogs at Helsinki Airport picked out a number of people as positive. Tested in the usual way later, they were negative. But after a few days these people started to report Covid symptoms. The Finnish dogs had identified the Covid infection at a much earlier stage than the conventional virus test completed in the laboratory!

FACT

Dogs keep humans healthier. A survey pf 300,000 Swedish heart and stroke patients revealed that the mortality rate among patients who lived alone

but had a dog was a third lower than those without a pet. A researcher on the project said, "If a dog was a drug it would make a pharmaceutical company very, very rich!"

FACT

You cannot predict the behaviour of an individual dog based solely on its breed. No dog breed is naturally aggressive. They can all be friendly with the right training and upbringing! Also, personality and friendliness is the same in both male and female dogs.

FACT

Dogs can display extraordinary loyalty, and the famous Greyfriar's Bobby is not the only one! After his beloved master died, a Spanish dog called Canelo retraced three times a week for the next 12 years the steps the two of them had taken to hospital in Cadiz for the man's dialysis treatment. And in Tokyo there is a statue of a dog

called Hachiko who, after his owner died, returned every day at the same time to the same station where he had always met his owner home from work. Loyal Hachiko did this for nine years.


