The wee Yorkie developed cancer in her eyes and they were removed in an operation which saved her life but not her sight. Then, 7 years later she was left alone and came to PADS to find a new home. Now the TASTE in Holly's life is unbeatable. Teri, an inspired cook, adds organic veg to Holly's homecooked mince and chicken. The SMELLS Holly encounters in Paul and Teri's gorgeous, dogproof walled garden near Alyth are a canine dream come true. The gentle TOUCH of her humans give her a sense of security and she knows she is safe and can TRUST them. She sniffs out a familiar route around the garden every day, stopping for a wee swim in one of the pools before heading back for breakfast. Paul says, "We put our souls into the creation of this garden and I am sure Holly can sense the dedication and the love that went into it. It was designed as a therapy garden and I think she senses the peace and security there. She was confused and scared at the start, but gradually settled in when her new surroundings became familiar to her."

LIVING EACH DAY WITH THE FEAR OF LOSING THE DOG YOU LOVE

In a fast-changing world there are many new issues for dogs and their owners to deal with. PADS NEWS will try to keep you in touch with at least some of these.

THE MOST IMPORTANT THING YOUR DOG MUST HAVE

Holding her tiny dog gently in her arms, a frail, elderly lady from Perth said sadly, "I am terrified to let my dog out in the garden by herself in case she is stolen. We should not have to live like this!" The awful truth is that there are many thousands of dog owners in Scotland who feel just the same. It once was the case that the dog, large or small, guarded our home with a warning bark. Now it is the owner who has to guard the dog. The rise in dog thefts is due to the rocketing prices people were willing to pay for puppies during the pandemic. The fear of losing a pet to theft causes serious anxiety and if it should happen the emotional damage is immeasurable. Scottish SPCA Chief Superintendent Mike Flynn said, "Animals are stolen for breeding purposes or because they are sold on for profit. Owners must remain cautious. And make sure they are microchipped." In order to deter theft, the UK Government is to introduce in England a new law which will make a specific criminal offence of Pet Abduction. Currently, stealing a dog has the same penalty as stealing a phone. It is not a specific crime, but this will soon change in England. UK Environment Secretary George Eustace said, "Pet owners should not have to live in fear. This move acknowledges the unique distress caused by this crime." The new law, however does not apply to Scotland, and campaigners are demanding that lawmakers here do the same. We asked the Scottish Government in mid October if there were plans to follow Westminster in creating a specific crime for pet theft, but so far we have had no response.

You have the dog bed, the fluffy blanket, the shiny new lead, the bowls, the food and the tasty treats. Now, let's think. What have you missed? Well, the most vital thing of all isn't there. PET INSURANCE! In the last decade or so, vet fees have risen...a lot. In fact, the cost of treatment for your dog is going up by around 12 % each year. There are several reasons for this. Dogs are big business. They were even before the pandemic. Now investment companies are buying up vet practices and the result is almost always higher prices for treatment. In addition, due to advances in veterinary medicine and the use of new diagnostic and imaging equipment treatment bills go up even further. Vets themselves say that the big cost rises are brought about by the increased number of options which have become available. Now, the cost of a relatively straightforward procedure such as tooth extraction can run into hundreds of pounds. An MRI scan for a dog could set you back £3,000 and the cost of drugs for animals is also on the increase. BBC presenter Justin Webb recently shocked viewers when he revealed that an operation to remove a sock from his dog's stomach had cost £5,000. Luckily, the animal was properly insured, but on average only 1 in 4 companion dogs in the UK are covered by pet insurance which, of course, has also increased in price. The latter, however, is by far the best option. Imagine if your beloved dog had to suffer or die because you could not afford a vet bill! Check out the insurance options and protect your dog. Remember, there is no NHS for dogs!

Vets are incredibly busy, training classes are overflowing, dog groomers are all booked up. There are many more dogs for society to handle and the result will be a big increase in the numbers of unwanted animals coming through the doors of the shelters. Not all, but many of them will be neglected, abused, poorly bred and with behavioural problems. At the moment, for example, we have a badly-bred French Bulldog who is stone deaf and will need a great deal of rehabilitation. There is a lovely, happy Chocolate Lab who has had five litters of puppies. She weighs in at 37 kilos (80 lbs) and will have to go on a very long diet before we try to find her a home. We recently rehomed a lovely little Collie who had spent the first five years of her life locked in a shed! Post-Covid I imagine there will be many more like these!"
