CHECK OUT THOSE CHIPS!

LAST NEW YEAR'S DAY a lost. lonely and confused young Doberman dog sat sadly on the doorstep of a stranger's house in Perth. Police were contacted and a few hours later he was under the care of PADS, and given the name Quinn. A scan revealed that he had two identity chips, one Romanian and the other Bulgarian. Both chip numbers proved dead ends, for they had never been re- registered with numbers and contact details with any of the UK chip agencies. Poor Quinn remains anonymous, a lost dog without an identity. He is still with us and needs long term socializing and training before he has the chance of a new start in life. Quinn is just one of many thousands of rescue dogs regularly coming into to the UK. One source quotes the staggering figure of more than 300,000 each year. In 2019 almost 20,000 dogs came in from Romania alone. Others come from countries such as Poland, Cyprus, Macedonia, Bulgaria and now Ukraine, where the suffering of abandoned animals is terrible.

Understandably, many UK dog lovers want to give homes to street dogs and save them from a wretched existence. Also, there is more choice. Rescue puppies are scarce in the UK nowadays so foreign born ones fill the gap. It is also harder now to adopt from the big UK charities. Many folk can be refused a dog if they work away from home or have small children. So it happens that adoptees will open their doors to foreign dogs instead. If you are one of them, the dog you received may well be chipped, but if that foreign chip is not reregistered with a UK chip agency with your contact details and your dog goes missing you may never be reunited with your beloved pet. If you need advice contact us at PADS, or ask your vet, who can scan the new dog's foreign chip and give you the number to pass on to the chip agency. Identibase, an agency with 5 million animals on its database, advises, "If you have a foreign dog, check the chip, get the number and register that number with a UK agency along with your details. Then, if your dog is lost you can be traced." Good advice. Remember what has happened to Quinn.

THE POWER OF PEACE AND QUIET TO HEAL UNHAPPY DOGS



Relaxing on a comfy deckchair, Josie, a 7 year old Shih Tzu, is testing the new PADS therapy garden, tongue ready to catch a treat! The PADS project, finished this spring, is a special quiet area for traumatized, scared and disorientated dogs who have lost their own homes and cannot bear the noise of the kennels when they first arrive at the shelter. It is also designed as a place where prospective adopters can meet and get to know the dog they may want to rehome. The therapy garden is quite near to the railway line between Perth and Inverness. but for some reason the dogs are not bothered one little bit by the noise of the trains. Better than all that barking, says Josie!

THE TRANSFORMATION OF a piece of unused ground within the PADS kennel complex began early last year. Previously just an empty area with some straggly old trees, it has now been fenced in and planted with shrubs in tubs and big old tractor tyres. There are quiet corners, plenty of shade under a new gazebo and some agility equipment for the more energetic animals. Manager Louise Perrett says that roughly one third of the dogs who come to PADS either as strays or brought to the charity by owners, badly need this new peaceful environment. "We are getting in more and more middle aged dogs, say 6 years and over, who have lived a quiet life and find it very difficult to adapt to a noisy one in a kennel next to other dogs. When they arrive here they are disorientated and disturbed by all the noise around them and they just freeze." Often, she adds, it can take days, even weeks in some cases, for a dog to be coaxed from its kennel. Pippin and Missy, two little middle-aged Lhasa Apsos who arrived recently were terrified. It took several days to give them the confidence to come out of their kennels into the world of the new therapy garden but when they got there, they loved it! Louise said, "They relaxed immediately and pottered around happily in this nice quiet place. They had been miserable in the strange kennel surroundings, but in the garden they were calm and seemed happy again." The project was the brainchild of PADS Vice Chair Heather Wallace, who said, "The garden space will also be a great meeting place for new adopters and dogs, somewhere they can get to know each other away from the hustle and bustle of kennel life! The dogs can meet the adopters without being distracted by other dogs." Heather added, "We gave a lot of thought to what we should do with this area of ground and decided this was the best option. The garden will calm and give confidence to many dogs who are taking their first steps towards a new home!"

SCOTTY DOG TIP Meeting a strange dog on a walk if yours or the other dog isn't socialized can be a nightmare. Often, teeth are bared and snarls are heard! Putting your dog on a short lead on the side away from one approaching means you are in the guard position, and your dog will feel more relaxed because he feels protected. Then, a simple 'good morning' to the strange dog's owner, followed by a cheerful 'what a lovely day' kind of conversation, may give both dogs a clue that this is a friendly encounter. If you meet the other dog regularly, another trick is to do a wee walk together, owners in between, dogs on the outside on short leads. They may or may not become pals. Worth a try!



RECORD BREAKER ONE

WE THINK that James Pieroni (on the right) is PADS' top adopter. We don't keep data on this but are pretty sure that James has adopted more PADS dogs than anyone else, EVER. Late last year James and Chris Menday opened their home in Blairgowrie to these two Dachshunds.

They are the 5th and 6th PADS dogs adopted by James. On the right is Dash, aged 5 and on the left is 18 month old Bowie, named after the legendary rock star who also had one blue eye! James gave a home to his first PADS dog, Ben in 1998. He remembers, "Ben was a mix of everything, just 12 weeks old when I got him and he was 16 when he died." Then along came Hamish, a fluffy wee wheaten terrier. Next, in 2014, was puppy Max, now 10, a smooth coated, very large, gentle Labradoodle, who is, says James, "The perfect dog. Max never barks!"



Flint the Lab aged 10, who had given birth to 22 puppies in 3 litters, arrived in 2016, the year James and Chris got married. She died 3 years later. James says, "We gave her the best in the last years of her life. Every dog deserves a home. These two won't be the last we adopt!"
